

Perception Survey

Thank you very much to the 647 parents/carers who responded to the College perception survey. The feedback will be used to inform planning for 2019 and our 2020-2024 Strategic Plan, which will be developed throughout 2019. I will address the feedback from the community in a report later this term.

The responses to the survey were overwhelmingly positive, with all fields scoring the top two available ratings - Excellent or Good. The fields scoring in the 'best practice' range are: Learning Environment, Cocurriculum, Reporting, Values & Culture, Leadership & Direction, Resources & Facilities, Teaching Standards and Pastoral Care/Wellbeing. The 2019 Conference is the first held in Australia and will be hosted at Schols by Good Samaritan Education. Planning has been underway for two years and will continue with increasing earnestness over the next 12 months. PISA Testing

Our College was selected to participate in the PISA Test for 2018. The Program for International Student Assessment (PISA) is a worldwide study conducted by the OECD to evaluate educational systems by measuring students in mathematics, science and reading literacy. The test is conducted every three years and the findings, which are published, are used in forward planning. Approximately 30 randomly selected Schols students from Years 9, 10 and 11 were on Wednesday 22nd tested August. congratulations to the girls who participated, it is always heartening to see the effort with which students apply themselves. The College will receive results at the end of the year.

NAPLAN Readiness

NAPLAN testing will be conducted online in 2019. In preparation for this, Year 7 will be participating in a readiness test on Monday 3rd September and parents and students have been advised via email. Reflection

I recently visited a Year 12 year meeting to discuss the role of feedback and reflection. Year 12s are currently receiving their Trial HSC examination results and it is important they spend time considering how they can improve on their results before the HSC. I explained in detail the reflective process and how helpful it is when preparing for exams. It is essential Year 12s remain focussed on their studies because there is still time to make a difference to their overall result. Continual practice of past exams and completion of questions, either individually or in groups, will help students to achieve their best. This is a worthwhile conversation to have with your daughter as soon as possible.

The 9D cinema...like a show ride but with a twist, all of the rides are in 3D, the seats move as if you are on a roller coaster and, watch out if the ride goes through water!









- Disneyland

From the Science Department

Science Excursion by Hannah Sheils and Jasmine Fawor, Year 12

On 23rd August, the Year 12 Biology cohort travelled to the Sydney Children's Hospital and the Museum of Human Disease to further their learning about the Biology topics 'Maintaining a Balance' and 'Search for Better Health'. At the hospital, we were fortunate enough to receive a lecture from staff members, including a nurse and a genetic counsellor. The hospital offered us the opportunity to revise some of our syllabus content on infectious diseases, blood components, kidney dialysis and genetics. The lecture also developed our understanding on the importance of health by educating us on the advanced technologies that treat disease. We were

able to practically apply our knowledge by using different equipment such as pulse oximeters and blood pressure machines as well as examining authentic samples of blood products. Overall, our visit to the hospital allowed us to understand how the theory learnt in class is applied in practical situations.

After our visit to the hospital, we continued our excursion to the Museum of Human Disease at UNSW. First, we had a workshop to investigate human case studies involving stroke and cirrhosis of the liver. After the workshop, we explored the rest of the museum where we used the specimens and the information on posters to fill in our booklets on infectious, non-infectious, inherited, nutritional and environmental diseases. The importance of respect and understanding of the specimens was emphasised, as was the importance of maintaining a healthy diet and regular exercise in the prevention of diseases. The volunteers, who were current university students, further guided our visit by explaining the circumstances of the patients behind the specimens. At times, the experience was confronting. However, it was a valuable experience that developed our understanding of disease. The Year 12 Biology cohort would like to thank Ms Unice and Ms Doherty for organising a day that we all enjoyed and learned from.

Year 11 Biology Excursion

On Tuesday 28th August, Preliminary Biology students visited the Sugarloaf area at Lane Cove National Park. Originally the area was cleared for farms and forests were cut down to provide fuel and building materials. In the 1950s much of the site was buried under a garbage tip and in the 1960s Sugarloaf Point and the banks of the river were damaged by sand mining. This chequered history provides our students with the opportunity to study how human activity can impact on an ecosystem and investigate practices used to rehabilitate damaged ecosystems. These include the installation of nest boxes, fox baiting, weed removal, bush regeneration and the recent restoration of a section of the Buffalo Creek channel to improve the wetland environment.

The reserve is home to the endangered frog, the Redcrowned Toadlet, and isolated populations of the long-nosed bandicoot. Our students measured biotic and abiotic factors using a number of techniques to determine the relationships in this ecosystem. They also modelled adaptations of the bandicoot using improvised props, including socks, pliers and paddle pop sticks — a challenge they accepted with much good humour.


