Term 2 Summary

Progress was made in a number of areas in Term 2 -

• We hosted our first Mother's Day Mass, which was well attended and appreciated. In the area of Mission, work centred on improving the liturgical and prayer life of the community; building upon the Catechist Program (20 students selected from 50 applicants, working across four local public schools); fundraising for the Society of St Vincent de Paul's Winter Appeal and the Good Sam Foundation; refocusing our reflection

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days on the charism of the College; and strengthening community service volunteering. Students also represented the College at the Mary Help of Christians Mass at the Cathedral and the Student Leadership Forum with the Archbishop.

- A specialised elective class established this year to build targeted skills in literacy and numeracy and the literacy remediation programs offered (QuickSmart and MultiLit) bore fruits in the recent Minimum Standards testing, with all students meeting the standard in Reading and 93% of students meeting the standard in Numeracy.
- The Pastoral Care team has continued to build on the work of establishing and delivering high quality Pastoral Plans and House-based activities continue to flourish.
- We have completed the process of ensuring compliance with the 2018 NESA-identified audit domains and establishing all curriculum compliance online and staff have been working to develop programs and resources for the delivery of new HSC programs and assessments. There has been ongoing management of Teacher Accreditation and improvements in support for students with additional learning needs.
- There has been significant improvement in the stewardship of our environment, with littering almost completely eradicated and outstanding efforts in recycling.
- The Governance Committee has been reviewing policies, establishing consistent presentation and researching best practice in policy communication. This work will continue next semester.
- The Building Master Plan Stage 2/3 tenders have been reviewed and a contractor is expected to be appointed next week in preparation for the commencement of works in September. Details will be provided next term.

NAIDOC Week

This week we celebrated NAIDOC Week. It was a joy to experience the many, diverse elements of the weeklong celebration that is a highlight of our College annual calendar. Our whole school assembly focused on the 2018 theme, "Because of her, we can!" It was a wonderful celebration of women who have played an important role in the lives of our First Peoples.

Other celebrations included an art workshop, open dance masterclass conducted by Rayma Johnson, exhibition of artworks from our Indigenous students and the major works from the Year 12 Aboriginal Studies class, flag-raising ceremony and morning tea. The annual grudge volleyball match between staff and the Indigenous student team unfortunately had to be postponed until next term due to the wet weather conditions.

Student Achievements

I attended the graduation of our Year 12 girls from the AIME program last Friday at the University of Sydney. The girls were presented with graduation certificates and the traditional AIME hoodie, this year in a striking red design. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students are able to participate in the AIME mentoring program from Year 9 onwards. We are very proud of Nakita, Zara and Sarah-Jane.



The Year 11 Drama class delighted audiences with a creative 'staging' of Mother Courage. The audience moved through each set and clever costume changes enabled a smooth flow of cast members through various lead roles. Well done to Ms. Sills, Mr. Whaley and the Year11 Drama class.

Tomorrow night, our remaining debating teams will battle out the first semi-final of the Catholic Schools Debating Association (CSDA) competition. The season has been a very positive one, with teams in every Year group having successes. I thank our debaters for their efforts and representing the College so well and Ms Carlson for her work with the teams.

The Year 9 Music class presented an outstanding 'original' musical, based loosely on Harry Potter, but with shades of Romeo and Juliet, and with arrangements of contemporary songs adapted to fit the plot. It was a clever piece of work built upon the combined efforts and talents of the class, including composition, arrangement, choreography, dance, singing, acting, and accompanying. It was a very entertaining evening.

The annual Music camp and the Year 8 Music Cup and the Year 8 Code Rangers coding day were very successful again this term.

I hope the mid-year break is enjoyable for all families.

CASE Space School Program 2019

We are pleased to announce that we are hosting an evening at the College for students interested in the CASE Space School International Study Program in 2019, in August.

The CASE Space School will provide an amazing opportunity for students seeking to pursue success in a STEAM career. Students will participate in enriched and exclusive space science activities exploring the multi-facets of STEAM. Students will also learn and engage in an inspiring personal and leadership development program that will truly empower them for changing times.

Junior Space School is astronaut training for youth and is an engaging, hands-on adventure. Students learn about space travel, the development of space-related technologies and are lead through several simulated missions. This program is focused on providing relevance to, and inspiring passion for STEAM through exposure to space and broader 'earth' science exploration. Every step of the way students are guided to build skills in goal setting, project planning, critical-thinking and problem solving.

NAIDOC Week





Winter Warmers Food Truck



From the English Department

In Week 6 of Term 2, the Schols Writers' Festival of 2018 involved girls from Years 7 to 11.

Slam Poet Philip Wilcox performed for Years 8, 9, 10, and 11 separately. His presentation was interactive and he orchestrated the students to make sound effects for his words. He also invited the students to click their fingers when they appreciated a line or a word, and this activity exposed the keenness with which they were listening and awareness of poetic techniques in operation.

Year Seven attended the Festival all day. The day was divided between Oliver Phommavanh (middle school text author) and Tug Dumbly (spoken word poet, social commentator and writer), each of whom presented their own anecdotes, written words, and opportunities for student participation. I also took a third group in a round robin, and during this time girls worked in groups to come up with a Slogan for the Writers' Festival, and paragraphs explaining what they had learnt. Year 11 participated a Q & A style panel discussion involving four young female writers who came from different backgrounds, explained their reasons for and need to write, and took many questions

afterwards. Emily Maguire was the moderator, and the writers were Phoebe Grainer, Sara Saleh, and Sarah Ayoub. The topic of their presentation was "The personal is political" and they held the students spellbound. They explained the origins of the Stella Prize (first awarded in 2013). Year 9 attended all day. The students were divided between John Larkin, Writer in Residence at Knox Grammar and UTS, who spoke to the girls in anecdotes and writing extracts, and Tug Dumbly again. I took up a third group and organised groups of girls to write a 30 line poem for group performance in a time-frame.

Students and supervising teachers have told me that the days were valuable, and memorable. I have taken away pages of the girls' writing for editing and publication in the near future.
