Ramadan Iftar Dinner - 'Ministers of Mercy'

On Tuesday 7th May a group of students, staff and families of the College were invited to a Ramadan Iftar Dinner at the Good Samaritan Congregation Centre. The evening was hosted by the Sisters of the Good Samaritan and Affinity Intercultural Foundation.

This week marked the beginning of Ramadan - the ninth month on the Islamic calendar when Muslims fast from dawn to dusk and engage in the spiritual reflection of God. Fasting in Ramadan is a special part of the Islamic faith and one of its five pillars. The Holy month of Ramadan is a time for reflection, almsgiving, compassion and unity.

The theme for the dinner was "Ministers of Mercy" which acknowledged the significance of the concept of Mercy present in both the Muslim and Christian traditions. Both Affinity and the Sisters of the Good Samaritan have a strong belief that through such events we can build a better future for our society, a future based on respect, understanding and peace. From the Science Department

Excursion to Lady Elliot Island - by the students who went In the April school holidays, 24 Science and Geography students along with 6 teachers travelled to Lady Elliot Island, 80 km off the Queensland coast. The island is a 42-hectare coral cay on the southern Great Barrier Reef. The resort operates within the green zone of the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park, meaning that there is a 'look but don't touch' motto.

We participated in a program called CoralWatch. This is a global program with a database that monitors the extent of coral bleaching around the world. The students and the teachers surveyed the corals on both sides of the island through random selection of corals, a permanent transect and via three 30m random transects. The Coral Health Data Card was used to identify the type of coral (boulder, plate, branching or soft) and the lightest and darkest colours on the particular coral specimen. Longitudinal studies of the coral colour on Lady Elliot Island can identify any trends in the coral health over time.

The majority of our time on the island was spent in the water, in the lagoon, the lighthouse bommies and the coral garden. The experience of snorkelling among mountainous corals, three species of turtle, sharks, giant clams, octopus and myriad of colourful fish was unforgettable. We were also very lucky to see a manta ray, the iconic species of the island.

Lady Elliot Island was once the site of a phosphate mine and now it is a certified eco resort. We had a 'behind the scenes' tour of the resort and learnt that it is 80% solar powered, composts most wastes and runs a program that has seen the successful revegetation of the island. We feel as though we contributed to the island by spending a morning clearing a large patch of weeds in preparation for replanting. Freshwater on remote islands is a valuable commodity. Lady Elliot Island uses desalination to provide drinking water but is also taking part in a trial of Source Water technology where solar powered panels retrieve water from the air. The management of the island is totally committed to sustainability.

Presentations by experts in the evenings enhanced our experience of this environment. Karen Hofmann from the University of Queensland gave a presentation to us on the role of tourism in changing people's perception of their individual responsibility towards environmental issues. She discussed our role in educating others based on the knowledge we acquired on this trip.

We are now able to understand the biological, economic and intrinsic value of the Great Barrier Reef and how important it is for the reef to last for future generations.











Year 9 and 10 Students: the ConocoPhillips Science Experience

This is a nationwide STEM outreach program for students in Year 9 or 10 in 2019/2020.

If you are in Year 9 or 10 and love Science, consider the ConocoPhillips Science Experience. There is no selection process and all students are welcome to attend.

It involves 3 – 4 days of hands-on science, conducted across 33 Australian universities. The program includes

- Hands on activities in the laboratories
- Short interactive lectures
- Visits to local scientific sites

The cost for the 3-day program is \$190 and the 4-day program is \$260.

Japanese Shougi Workshop! by Meghan Boyle, Year 8

On 2nd April, Ms Alves brought a guest to class who is a Japanese professional Shougi player, to teach us the art of Shougi (Japanese chess). During the session we learnt the basic skills, how it differs from normal chess and the types that you can play. (The professional game involves 40 pieces! The pieces you captured can be reused as your own.) Because of our skills we got to play the easiest one, Animal Shougi. It involved 8 different pieces (four for each player) on a 3 square by 4 square board. The aim was to take the other player's characters and then take the king. Over time, we started a competition and were able to play properly. It was so much fun because we got to learn a traditional Japanese game and learn about the culture. Hopefully we can do it again.



During the 2.5-week stay, the Italian exchange student will attend school with your daughter every Monday and Tuesday, and from Wednesday to Friday, either participate in a day of work experience, or an organised tour.

Dragon Boat Nationals 2019 - By Lillian Gee

Over the Easter break, 34 girls from Years 7 to 11 represented Schols at the 2019 Australian Dragon Boat Championships held in Yarralumla, Canberra. The College took one 20s boat and one 10s boat to compete over 200m, 500m and 2km. It was the first time that Schols had entered a 10s boat into the competition. As well, history was made with the largest number of Schols girls to compete at an Australian Championships. The 10s had some extremely tough competition this year; despite



tipping boats and chafed arms the girls pushed hard and were justifiably rewarded with Silver over 200m and 500m and Bronze in the 2km. The 20s paddles were outstanding. Sure, there were some experienced paddlers but most had been paddling only since the start of February. The girls took home a clean sweep of Gold across 200m, 500m

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data

on school students with Disability

What is the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) is a process that all schools must complete on an annual basis. It is designed to count the number of students who receive additional adjustments or "help" at school because of a disability. This national data collection helps federal and state governments plan for the needs of students with disability. It is also the way that schools seek and receive funding to support the learning needs of their students.

Who is included in the data collection?

To include a student in the NCCD data collection, schools must consider some key questions:

- 1. Is the student receiving adjustments to assist them with their ability to participate in schooling on the same basis as their peers?
- 2. Does the student meet the NCCD's broad definition of disability?
- 3. Has the school discussed the adjustments (help) with the student and/or parent/carer/guardian?
- 4. Does the school have documentation (assessments, medical reports or other paperwork) about the student's functional needs, the adjustments (help) that they provided and how the student progressed over time?

Where the school decides that the four steps above are in place (i.e. the student meets the NCCD criteria), the school then decides the best disability category how much help (adjustment level) that student is provided with.

What is the broad definition of disability?

The NCCD definition of disability is based on the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and there are four categories; sensory (e.g. vision/hearing impairment), cognitive, social-emotional and physical.

The definition of disability is very broad and many students that need help at school can be counted in the NCCD. Students with learning disorders e.g. specific learning disability or reading impairment (sometimes referred to as dyslexia), ADHD or auditory processing disorder, chronic health conditions (e.g. epilepsy or diabetes), physical disability (e.g. cerebral palsy), vision/hearing impairment and social-emotional disorders (e.g. selective mutism, anxiety disorders, Autism Spectrum Disorder) may be included in the data count.

A formal diagnosis by a specialist may be very helpful for the school but is not needed in the NCCD. The NCCD count is based on professional teacher judgement. Schools can consider school based and external documents to decide if a student can be counted.

What are examples of adjustments?

Students need different types of help at school. Some students need a little help sometimes (minor adjustments) but other students need a lot of help nearly all the time (extensive adjustments). The type of help and support that a school provides is also very different depending on the needs of the student. The adjustments can include physical changes to the school buildings or grounds (e.g. ramps or special equipment), extra teacher support in classes, special learning programs, changes to the way the curriculum is presented and delivered or extra adult assistance.

How will the data collection be different in 2019?

All schools have been completing the NCCD count since 2015. The NCCD data that schools collect will now be used by the government as part of the funding to schools.

What information is needed about my child?

Schools work together with parents/guardians/carers to understand the needs of each child. Your knowledge of your child's development and learning needs is important and valuable in this process. It will be very helpful to provide your child's teacher with a copy of any relevant past reports (e.g. from a psychologist, speech pathologist, doctor, Paediatrician, OT etc.). These reports will be used with information from your child's teacher, such as information about your child's reading progress or a Personalised Learning Plan, to build a picture of your child's needs and the help that the school is providing.

How is information collected?

The data collection process involves input from teachers, principals, and other school staff working together to consider the data for students with disability in their school, the category of disability and the level of adjustment that best reflects each student's needs.

As a first step, teachers consult with the student and their parent/guardian/carer, to discuss the student's strengths and the areas where the student needs extra support. The support could be support for their learning, behaviour support, support for medical needs, participation, or other areas where the student needs extra help. Information is collected about the type of adjustments the school is making so that they can participate and learn on the same basis as other students. Documentation, such as diagnostic reports, school reports, parent-teacher interviews, Collaborative Planning Meetings and Personalised Learning Plans, will help to provide evidence of the type support that the school is providing.

What happens to the data? Is it confidential?

All schools must complete the NCCD. Each school principal is required to verify and submit data about students with disability in their school during August of each year. The privacy and confidentiality of all students and their families is respected and handled as per the school's *Privacy Policy and Collection Notice*. Please refer to your school's policies for further information.

Do schools require active consent from parents to include students in NCCD?

Amendments were made to the *Australian Education Act 2013* and subsequent Regulations. As such, schools do not require parents/carers/guardians to provide active consent for students to be included in the NCCD. Nor is there an option for parents/carers/guardians to request their child not be included (opt-out option).
